Antenatal Steroids AFTER 34 Weeks Gestation?

According to ACOG, "recent data indicate that betamethasone decreases newborn respiratory morbidity when given to women in the late preterm period between 34 0/7 weeks and 36 6/7 weeks who are at risk of preterm delivery within 7 days and who have not previously received corticosteroids." The presenter will explore the new guidelines and discuss their implementation in practice.
